Consular news

Visa application process

- Please be informed that the application process for Schengen visa to Belgium takes at least 15 days. In addition, you should book your appointment to apply for a visa online and timely in order to ensure enough time for the visa application process. More information can be found here.

Visa section - In case of any visa enquiries, you can now contact <u>nairobi.visa@diplobel.fed.be</u>.

Outsourcing visa section Nairobi – By the end of the year the services to the public of the visa section will be outsourced. All visa applications will be received by TLS Contact Nairobi; the firm will also handle all communication concerning visa. The exact date of the launch of this new project will be announced later.

Consular missions – Consul Hilde Van Inthoudt will travel to Mombasa on November 3 with her European colleagues where she will provide consular services to Belgians.

A consular mission to Madagascar is scheduled in October. The Belgians registered in the Embassy will be informed of the exact dates and place of meeting by e-mail.

Embassy closed - The Embassy will remain closed:

- on October 20 : Mashujaa Day,
- On December 12 : Jamhuri Day,
- during the Christmas holidays from Monday December 26 till Tuesday January 2. On Wednesday January 3 all services will be open again.

Diplomatic news

Richard Leakey (KWS) - On September 9, the Ambassador of Belgium organised an interesting breakfast meeting with Richard Leakey: conservationist, palaeontologist and chairman of Kenya Wildlife Services. In the company of other Ambassadors they exchanged thoughts on wildlife conservation, governance and the Kenyan environment.

Belgium and UN environment: partners in Sustainable Development - The Belgian Minister for Development Cooperation Alexander De Croo and Un Environment Chief Erik Solheim signed a new deal to work together on implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

They also discussed Belgium's foreign environmental priorities, including the impact of conflicts on the environment in the African Great Lakes Region, the role of the private sector, digital innovation and the progress of international cooperation in more fragile countries – a topic of great interest for



Belgium. The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) is an essential partner in Belgium's multilateral cooperation. Over the period 2013-2016, our country contributed more than €16 million to the organisation, of which more than €4 million was given in 2016 alone. Belgium was the 8th biggest donor to the Environment Fund 2015.

In focus - Marleen Temmerman - ICRH and Aga Khan Development Network

What brought you to Kenya?

As a medicine student, I was always passionate about working abroad in development countries. This passion brought me as an intern student in many places around the world. In 1985, being a young graduated gynecologist, I came to Kenya for the first time, to join Peter Piot's research team at the University of Nairobi. As a researcher I got the opportunity to work in Pumwani Maternity Hospital, the largest maternity in the world, here in the suburbs of Nairobi, where every day 80 to 100 women are giving birth. My research project on HIV and women has opened my eyes to other important health topics such maternal mortality, stillbirth, gender inequality, violence against women, and to fight for better health and rights for women and children. Instead of 1 year, I stayed 5 years, but when I returned to Belgium, I realized I had fallen in love with Kenya and wanted to continue our collaboration. I established the International **Centre for Reproductive** Health (ICRH) in 1994 an organization that aims to improve women's health and rights in the widest sense; not only in Africa, but also in Latin-America, Asia and Europe. I became Professor OB/GYN Ghent, was elected as Senator in the Belgian Parliament in 2007, and joined WHO in 2012 as Reproductive Director Health and Research. After retiring from WHO, early 2016, I got the opportunity to return to my 'old love': doing research and teaching in Kenya, at the Aga Khan University in



Nairobi.

What does your work at Aga Khan Development **Network entail?**

I'm Chair of the Gynaecology department at the Aga Khan University Hospital, and Director of the Centre of Excellence for Women, Children, Adolescents, Aga Khan University East-Africa where I do lead research and capacity strenthening in line with the Sustainable Development Goals.

You refer to Kenya as second home country; what do you like so much about Kenya?

My heart is in Kenya, ever since I arrived here for the first time thirty years ago. Kenyans are people who embrace life. I admire the strong African women in particular whose personal, social and economic situation is far more difficult than ours in the West, but who, despite all that, enjoy the small things in life. Their stories of warmth, solidarity and friendship make me sometimes feel http://icrh.org/

ashamed on us spoiled whining. In addition, Kenya is progressing rapidly, has a new progressive Constitution with respect for human rights and the potential to become a shining jewel on the African Crown.

Do you have any advice for countrymen moving to Kenya?

Don't judge too quickly! Try to understand Kenya first before making critical judgments about Kenyan habits, culture, politics or way of life, based on our western point of view. Belgians who move to Kenya are here by their own choice, so use this freedom to look at Kenya with a broad view and to enjoy Kenyan friendship, lifestyle, food and the beautiful landscapes!
